About MUCHAN

Muchan means **READY** in Hebrew and we are ready to move forward as the next generation of young Messianic Believers who are talented, passionate, multi-faceted instruments of Adonai. Muchan is a conference for Young Messianic Believers to thoughtfully navigate their heritage and faith both in today's challenging culture and in antiquity. We ask, "Are you READY for the Lord to show up in your life? And are you READY to be a change-agent for Him?"

READY TO BE RIGHT

Biblical Theme: Ready To Be Right When in Rome, we explore Romans! What is your true, God-given identity as a follower of Yeshua?

When we say Ready to be Right, we are referring to God's righteousness and how it applies to followers of Yeshua. It turns out that if you don't know the righteousness of God, you will never know the real you and how it can impact you today, and the world tomorrow.

In Romans, Paul informs the readers of the true standing of Jewish and Gentile people before God and about what Yeshua's sacrifice has really done for those who put their faith in Him. Through all of this, Paul demonstrates why Jewish people and all creation desperately need the Messiah.

Historical Theme: Rome and the Jews: Do you want the good news or the bad news?

According to the Talmud, Messiah still sits at the gates of Rome, dressed in rags and waiting until it is his time to be revealed. Jewish people have had a colorful history in Rome for over 2000 years, since before the time of Yeshua. Professor Z will explore the love-hate relationship that still exists between the Church of Rome and the Jews. So is/was Rome good for the Jews? You decide!

Why ROME?

The real question is "Why not Rome?"

Are you kidding? Did you really just ask that? Why not Rome? Mild winters. Tremendous history. Pizza and pasta every day! And a place with both a historically significant Jewish community as well as a modern one. Plus, there is a whole book of the Bible dedicated to the people here!

Rome has a vibrant Jewish quarter and incredible architecture and ruins. It is the seat of Catholicism and the city with some of the best art in the world. From the Colosseum to the Forum to the Arch of Titus and much more, you are going to love it.

Muchan: A Brief History

We choose a Muchan city and country based on its Jewish historical qualities. At our very first conference in Berlin, we learned about the Holocaust and even traveled to Auschwitz in Poland. We met local Messianic believers and shared a Saturday morning Shabbat service with them. At our second conference, held in Paris, we learned the harsh realities of modern antisemitism rising in France and Europe. We didn't meet too many local believers because, in reality, France doesn't have many believers, let alone Messianic believers. We blessed and prayed for the few who were working among the closed Jewish community of Paris. At our third conference, in Madrid, the biblical theme was the growing Messianic Jewish community in the Book of Acts. We also learned about the once vibrant Golden Age of Judaism in culture, art, science, commerce, literature and rabbinic thought even though today's local Jewish population in Spain is quite small. In our last Muchan conference in Prague, we delved into the radical side of Yeshua and learned about the history of Yiddish and Ashkenazi influence in eastern Europe.




Rome - Subway map and information

The Rome Metro (subway) is called **Metropolitana** by Italians. The metro runs approximately every 7-10 minutes, from 5:30am until 11.30pm every day (until 0:30am on Saturdays). Please note that there may be special holiday hours which may affect your plans on New Year's Eve. Ordinary tickets can be bought throughout the metro stations from vending machines or booths. Tickets can also be purchased in newsstands and "tabacchis" (a tobacco shop which sells much more than tobacco). Buses work in a similar way. To find routes to the hotel or to other locations, Google maps works pretty well.

Other modes of transport from Leonardo da Vinci-Fiumicino Airport (FCO)

Taxi: You can get a taxi for 30-50 Euros (depending on traffic). Additionally, if you know others arriving at the same time, you could share a taxi.

Shuttle bus info: Recommended! Visit **http://www.sitbusshuttle.com/en/fiumicino**. Choose from Fiumicino Airport to Circonvallazione Aurelia 19. It is about an 11 minute walk to the hotel from there. This should cost between 10 and 15 Euros round trip.

Rome - Tourism

During the conference, there will be a guided tour visiting many famous Rome landmarks, such as the Jewish quarter, Colosseum, Forum, Altare della Patria, Capitoline Hill, Plaza Venzia, and Trajan's Column. This tour won't give us entry passes but if you would like to visit places such as the Vatican, the Colosseum, the Forum or Castelo Sant'Angelo during your free time (see the schedule on page 11), please make sure that you book on legitimate websites. It is also wise to purchase a guided tour (available from many tour companies) of the Vatican Museum and Sistine Chapel as they can help you skip the line. The costs range from \$45 to well over \$150.

Rome - Tourism (dos and don'ts)

DOTHIS	BUT MAYBE DON'T DO THAT
DO BUY a ticket to the Colosseum, Palatine Hill, and the Forum on a legitimate website	DON'T TAKE PICTURES with people dressed as gladiators, they will ask you for money
DO SEND back the bread basket at a restaurant, it will often cost you 5 Euros just	DON'T DINE in restaurants near tourist traps. They are expensive and not very tasty
for bread DO SPECIFY tap water or bring a bottle of water with you in a restaurant. Bottles of	DON'T TIP the server at a restaurant. Believe it or not, this is not required in Italy; it is already built into the price
water can cost you 3 euros or more DO ORDER Caffe for a small strong espresso, or Caffe Americano for a drip coffee	DON'T SIT DOWN at a coffee shop. It will cost you way more than if you stand at the counter or take it to go
DO INSIST on the meter if you take a taxi and make sure it is an official Rome taxi.	DON'T SKIP VALIDATING your metro or bus ticket. Avoid fines by validating them on the bus or the machines on the train platforms.
DO BRING something to cover your shoulders and/or knees when visiting churches DO CHECK the exchange rate between your	DON'T TAKE PICTURES in certain areas in the Vatican (e.g. the Sistine chapel)
currency and euros before you change money at accredited exchange shops	DON'T USE an ATM card when the bank is closed in case there are any issues
DO WATCH your wallets and purses to guard against pickpockets (bring a copy of your passport along) DO BRING a water bottle to fill up throughout	DON'T WAIT to book tickets to tourist attractions like the Vatican or the Colosseum, buy them ahead of time from legitimate websites

Main Session / Speaker Bios

Dr. Jacob Rosenberg



Jacob (Jake) came to the Lord through an encounter with God at the age of 5. A voracious reader, he would stay up into the middle of most nights reading every book he could find. However, his faith did not always affect his decisions and he started towards a goal to make a million dollars by the time he was 20. While working at some of the largest companies in the world, his Dad encouraged him to pray to see if his life decisions were the same as God's plan

for his life. He challenged God to stop him if he could...he lost his job that week and found himself back in school studying religion and theology, leading to a BA in Religion, a Masters of Divinity, and a PhD in Historic Theology.

Along the way, God has blessed him with an incredible wife, Heather, wonderful children, and a life he could not have dreamed of while living in that tiny little kingdom of his own design. God changed his heart and then gave Jacob the desires of the heart; something he could not have prayed for but God was gracious enough to give.

He earned his PhD in Theological Studies from Trinity Evangelical Divinity School writing on Jewish missions in the United States between 1880-1920. While at Trinity, Jake was a Field Education Mentor and recipient of two awards, The Leaders in Ministry Scholarship and The James Fox Memorial Award. Jacob Rosenberg holds a license with the **IAMCS**. In addition, Jake is the head of the Theology Committee for the Union of Messianic Congregations.

Professor Z.



Professor Z is a Jewish believer from Buenos Aires, Argentina, and has a PhD in Jewish History and Chocolate Chip Cookie Baking. Her roots are in Eastern Europe since her Jewish parents emigrated from there to South America, but her fascination has been with medieval Jewish communities and Jewish Christian disputations.

She concentrated her Masters' research on the Tortosa Disputation, where the

Pope and the King of Aragon pitted a Jewish believer against a group of rabbis to convince them from the Talmud that the Messiah had already come. Professor Z has a BA in Judaic Studies, a Master of Arts' degree in Intercultural Studies and another Master's in Medieval Jewish History (specializing in Spain). She also holds a third Master's (of Philosophy) degree in Medieval Jewish History, as well as her PhD. She is currently a professor at the Charles Feinberg Center for Messianic Jewish Studies in New York City and teaches courses in Biblical Hebrew, Exegesis, Jewish History, Jewish Ethics (Pirkei Avot), and the theology of the Siddur.

- 1. Take the Orange Metro line from the Cornelia stop toward Anagnina.
- 2. Take the Metro 6 stops and get off at the Flaminio Stop.
- 3. The Piazza Del Popolo is about a 2 minute walk south of Flaminio.

1. Piazza Del Popolo



The Piazza del Popolo (meaning The People's Square) is located inside the northern gate of the city, which was once called Porta Flaminia. The square is situated at the beginning of Via Flaminia and was the main entrance to the city during the Roman Empire.

Once on the main route to the north, Piazza del Popolo is still strategically located. Three important streets part from the square: to the left, Via del

Babuino; to the right, Via di Ripetta and to the centre the Via del Corso, one of the **main shopping streets of Rome.**

An Egyptian obelisk dedicated to Ramesses II, called Flaminio Obelisk, is located at the centre of the piazza. Erected in the **Circus Maximus** during the tenth century, it was transferred to Piazza del Popolo in 1589. Many visitors come to Piazza del Popolo to see Santa Maria del Popolo, a basilica that features two magnificent canvases by Caravaggio and splendid Renaissance decorations.

2. Piazza di Spagna and The Spanish Steps



The Spanish Steps (Italian: Scalinata di Trinità dei Monti) are a set of steps in Rome, Italy, climbing a steep slope between the **Piazza di Spagna** at the base and Piazza Trinità dei Monti, dominated by the **Trinità dei Monti** church at the top. The monumental stairway of 135 steps (the slightly elevated drainage system is often mistaken for the first step) was built in 1723–1725 linking the **Bourbon** Spanish Embassy, and the Trinità dei Monti church that was under the patronage of the Bourbon kings of France. The stairway was designed by

architects Francesco de Sanctis and Alessandro Specchi.

In the Piazza di Spagna at the base of the steps is the Early Baroque fountain called **Fontana della Barcaccia** ("Fountain of the longboat"), built in 1627–29 and often credited to Pietro Bernini, father of a more famous son, **Gian Lorenzo Bernini**,

In the piazza, at the corner on the right as one begins to climb the steps, is the house where English poet **John Keats** lived and died in 1821; it is now a museum dedicated to his memory, full of memorabilia of the English Romantic generation. On the same right side stands the 15th-century former cardinal **Lorenzo Cybo de Mari**'s palace, now Ferrari di Valbona, a building altered in 1936 to designs by **Marcello Piacentini**, the main city planner during **Fascism**, with modern terraces perfectly in harmony with the surrounding baroque context.

3. Column of the Immaculate Conception



La Colonna della Immacolata/The Column of the Immaculate Conception is a 19th century monument depicting the Virgin Mary, located in the Piazza Mignanelli, towards the south east extension of **Piazza di Spagna**. It was placed aptly in front of the **Palazzo di Propaganda Fide** (offices for promulgating the faith), now renamed the **Congregation for the Evangelization of Peoples**. The monument was designed by architect **Luigi Poletti**, and the figure on top

was sculpted by Giuseppe Obici, commissioned by Ferdinand II, King of the Two Sicilies.

Since December 1953, **Pontiffs** have visited the monument annually and offered bouquets of flowers at the base to commemorate the **Feast of the Immaculate Conception**. The **Corinthian column** itself was sculpted in ancient Rome, and was discovered in 1777 during the construction of the monastery of **Santa Maria della Concezione** located in this area, the site of the former **Campus Martius**. The original column once bore the goddess **Minerva** carrying a shield, now lost in history. At the base are four statues of Old Testament prophets each accompanied by a quote of a biblical verse in Latin, including David (by Adam Tadolini), Isaiah (by Salvatore Revelli), Ezekiel (by Carlo Chelli), and Moses (by **Ignazio Jacometti**).

4. The Trevi Fountain



This is one of the most famous fountains in the world. The fountain is the largest **Baroque** fountain in the city and has appeared in several notable films: **Federico Fellini**'s **La Dolce Vita**, the eponymous **Three Coins in the Fountain**, and **Roman Holiday**. The majority of the piece is made from **Travertine** stone

Moses is seen with a forked beard and horns that some say are horns of light while others claim that the horns are representative of Moses from the

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Competitions had become popular during the **Baroque** era to design buildings, fountains, as well as the **Spanish Steps**. In 1730 **Pope Clement XII** organized

a contest in which **Nicola Salvi** initially lost to **Alessandro Galilei** – but due to the outcry in Rome over a Florentine winning, Salvi was awarded the commission. Salvi began work in 1732 and it was finished after his death by Guiseppe Pannini in 1762. It was officially opened and inaugurated on May 22, 1762 by **Pope Clement XIII**. Coins are purportedly meant to be thrown using the right hand over the left shoulder. This was the theme of 1954's **Three Coins in the Fountain** and the Academy Award-winning song by that name which introduced the picture.

An estimated 3,000 euros are thrown into the fountain each day. In 2016, an estimated €1.4 million (US\$1.5 million) was thrown into the fountain. The money has been used to subsidize a supermarket for Rome's needy; however, there are regular attempts to steal coins from the fountain, even though it is illegal to do so.

5. Piazza Navona



Built in the 1st century AD, the Piazza Navona is built on the site of the ancient **Stadium of Domitian**, and follows the form of the open space of the stadium.

Piazza Navona was transformed into a highly significant example of **Baroque** Roman architecture and art during the pontificate of **Innocent X**, who reigned from 1644 until 1655

It features important sculptural creations: in the center stands the famous **Fontana dei Quattro Fiumi** or Fountain of the Four Rivers (1651) by **Gian Lorenzo Bernini**, topped by the Obelisk of Domitian, brought in pieces from the **Circus of Maxentius**

Piazza Navona has two other fountains. At the southern end is the **Fontana del Moro** with a basin and four Tritons sculpted by **Giacomo della Porta** (1575) to which, in 1673, Bernini added a statue of a Moor, wrestling with a dolphin. At the northern end is the **Fountain of Neptune** (1574) also created by Giacomo della Porta. The statue of Neptune, by Antonio Della Bitta, was added in 1878 to create a balance with La Fontana del Moro.

6. Campo de' Fiori (Field of Flowers) and Statue of Giordano Bruno



The Campo de'Fiori became a center of community and commerce throughout the centuries. Since **Ancient Rome**, the area was unused space between **Pompey's Theatre** and the flood-prone **Tiber**. In 1456, under **Pope Callixtus III**, Ludovico Cardinal Trevisani paved the area as part of a large project to improve the area. Executions also took place there.

In the plaza is the hooded statue of Giordano Bruno looking defiantly toward the Vatican. Bruno was an Italian Dominican friar, philosopher, mathematician, poet, and cosmological theorist. On Ash Wednesday in the year 1600, he was hung upside down naked before being burned

at the stake due to the charges of heresy.

The speculation is that the charges were as follows:

- holding opinions contrary to the **Catholic faith** and speaking against it and its ministers;
- holding opinions contrary to the Catholic faith about the **Trinity**, divinity of Christ, and Incarnation;
- holding opinions contrary to the Catholic faith pertaining to Jesus as Christ;
- holding opinions contrary to the Catholic faith regarding the virginity of Mary, mother of Jesus;
- holding opinions contrary to the Catholic faith about both Transubstantiation and Mass;
- claiming the existence of a **plurality of worlds** and **their eternity**;
- believing in **metempsychosis** and in the **transmigration** of the human soul (reincarnation);
- dealing in magics and divination

He was also charged with Pantheism: Pantheism is the view that everything is part of an allencompassing, immanent God. All forms of reality may then be considered either modes of that Being, or identical with it. Some hold that pantheism is a non-religious philosophical position. To them, pantheism is the view that the Universe (in the sense of the totality of all existence) and God are identical (implying a denial of the personality and transcendence of God).

The statue was erected in 1889 by **Ettore Ferrari**, a leader of the Italian Masons. According to a 2008 article in the New Yorker by **Joan Acocella**, a noted American journalist, "Every year, on the anniversary of his execution, various groups of **freethinkers** — **Masons**, **atheists**, **pantheists** — gather at the monument, and a representative of **Rome**'s government places a wreath at its feet."

A statue of a stretched human figure standing on its head designed by **Alexander Polzin** depicting Bruno's death at the stake was placed in **Potsdamer Platz** station in **Berlin**, Germany on March 2, 2008.

7. Castel Sant'Angelo (Mausoleum of Hadrian)



Castel Sant'Angelo is now a museum, but was originally commissioned by the **Roman Emperor Hadrian** as a **mausoleum** for himself and his family. The building was later used (in the 14th century) by popes as a fortress and castle. **Pope Nicholas III** connected the castle to **St Peter's Basilica** by a covered fortified corridor called the **Passetto di Borgo**. The fortress was the refuge of **Pope Clement VII** from the siege of **Charles V**'s **Sacking of Rome (1527)**



The site and nearby bridge was the site of hundreds of executions until the 18th century. According to legend, the ghost of a young woman, **Beatrice Cenci**, appears at midnight between Sept 10th – 11th. She is seen wandering j the bridge holding her own severed head. In 1577, after suffering abuse from her father and failed attempts to garner the help of the pope, Beatrice killed her father Francesco and confessed. She and her family were sentenced to death even amidst the efforts of the people of Rome to stop the proceedings. Their

vast wealth was seized by the Vatican. Decommissioned in 1901, the castle is now a museum, the Museo Nazionale di Castel Sant'Angelo

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
